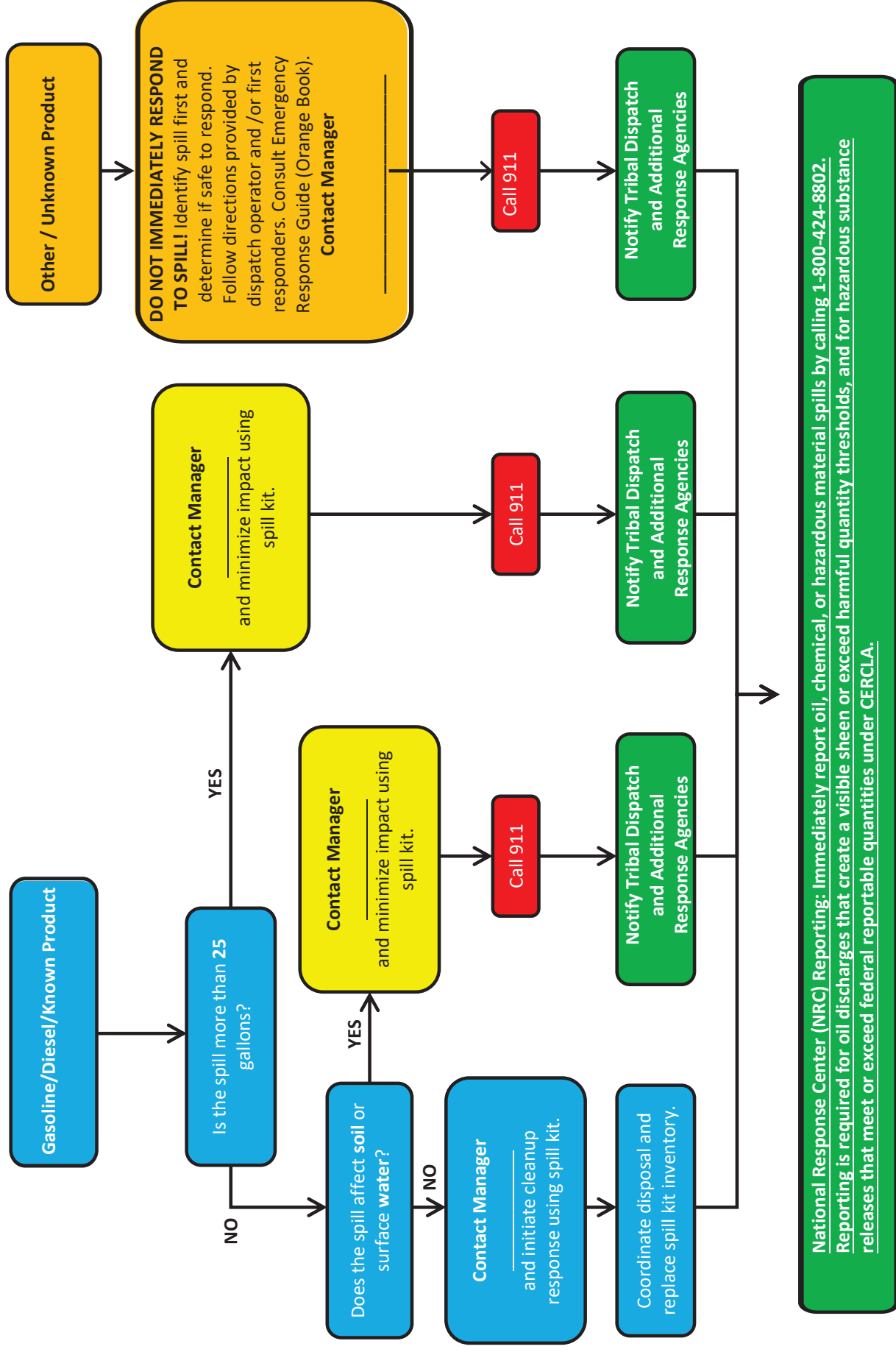


General Emergency Spill Response Flow Chart



Note: Always use Personal Protective Equipment (nitrile gloves and eye protection) when cleaning up a spill.

General Spill Response Guideline

The goal of this document is to provide general guidelines when faced with a hydrocarbon (oil, gasoline, diesel) spill.

Response

- Never respond to a chemical spill unless you know what the spilled material is, and you can safely respond. See reverse side for Emergency Spill Response Flow Chart for reference.
- **In case of a fire, personal injury, or unknown chemical always call 911 immediately.**
- Turn off any potential ignition sources (ex: running vehicles, power equipment). Do not allow smoking near the spill.
- If the spill is determined to a known chemical (ex: oil, gasoline, diesel) and it is safe to do so, attempt to stop the leaking source.
- Locate the nearest spill kit, put on protective gloves, and use absorbent pads “socks” to contain spill and dry absorbent (kitty litter) or mat pads to absorb free liquid, and prevent migration of liquid.
- Do not walk through or into spilled material and do not allow your skin or clothing to contact the spilled material.
- Chemical spills should not be handled without the proper personal protective equipment (minimum equipment: nitrile gloves).
- Block or barricade any floor drains or stormwater drains to prevent the spill from entering.
- Notify Tribal Dispatch and manager as soon as possible.

Follow Up

- Contaminated absorbents must be isolated and not thrown away in the general trash after use. They must be properly disposed, possibly as a hazardous waste.
- Replenish spill kit absorbent as soon as possible.
